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Term 3 Principal News

And just like that we have so quickly come to the end of term 3 at BCHS. It has been quite the whirlwind term where achievements of our students have been exceptional. There is so much to be proud of at BCHS.

We have been working hard this term to develop programs and improvements based on the community consultation. I am confident about the direction our school is taking and the opportunity for students expanding. Most of the new initiatives are set to launch in 2025. They include:

- · The Talented Arts Program
- · The Big Picture Pathway (information night is 24th October)
- · Excel2Accelerate a pathway for high potential and gifted students
- · Middle school program for Year 7
- · Enhanced transition program for our Year 6 students
- · Improved use of our learning spaces
- · Increased student voice in decision making
- · Reimagining HUB
- · Introducing Restorative practice to support behaviour development and conflict resolution.

The potential of the students at our school never ceases to amaze me. This term I spent significant time working with a group of Year 9 and 10 students to explore how we can make better use of our open learning spaces and learning street. Together we are partnering with architect, Dr Fiona Young. We began by posing the question, where do you like to learn? The workshops have culminated in scale models that we will use to explore with staff and then develop real life improvements to our learning spaces.

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Principal update continued...

I am keen to continue to tidy up our facilities and value add. Projects with the Department of Education can take time to ensure safety and compliance. Weather permitting, by the end of the year we should see:

- · A cover over our outdoor basketball court (COLA)
- · New carpet in the Learning Street, Level 1 and 2
- · Additional shade in the playground (requested by students)
- · Chairs for assembly (requested by students)
- · Some additional frosting on class between classrooms
- · Improved acoustic insulation in classrooms to reduce noise

On Thursday we celebrated the achievements of our Year 12 students and gave them a wonderful send off. We are so proud of them all. Best of luck to those heading into their Y12 exams. I have included my principal's speech for those who could not be present.



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Year 7 English Group Perfomances

Will Shakespeare be taught forever? We certainly think so. Year 7 are introduced to Shakespeare through Andy Griffith's 'Just Macbeth', a modernised play based on William Shakespeare's 1606 play, 'The Tragedy of Macbeth'. Three school children who are rehearsing a scene for this play are propelled onto a battlefield on a cold Scottish heath - and this is where the adventure begins.

BCHS students then stepped into the characters of Andy, Danny, Lennox, Witches and Warriors to perform a scene from 'Just Macbeth', with props, costumes, Scottish accents, sword fighting and whizz-fizz!

The students certainly stepped out of their comfort zones, and their classrooms (literally) as they rehearsed in the glorious Spring shade underneath the fig trees. There were opportunities for collaboration, creation, communication, comedy and problem-solving. Accompanying the group performances, students then wrote personal reflections and here are some glimpses of their experiences







Student reflections: 'My first thought when I heard we were learning about Shakespeare was confusion: why were we learning about some old guy who wrote boring lectures? Little did I know that my mind was about to be blown. I hadn't realised that so many of the stories I know and love were either written or inspired by Shakespeare.' (O.W.)

'When I heard about the group performance, I was scared, but the play and talking with other people made me overcome speaking in front of the class in the end.' (C.M.)

'I think performing Shakespeare instead of reading it is a good skill to have - you get to be someone you're not and you get to make it come to life.' (C.M.)

'We found out that one of the main characters in our group would be away for the group performance, so I stepped up and took her role even though I hate performing in front of people...we just solved the problem and went on.' (M.S.)

'My favourite lesson was the one in which I performed, and not just because I got to 'enjoy the stage', but also because watching my classmates perform the same thing as me helped me to adjust how I might have performed.' (O.W.)

'My favourite lesson would be the lesson where we got to go outside and rehearse the play. I loved rehearsing the play, because I feel like it was a time where I got to have fun while doing school work.' (H.H.)
